I am delighted to say I have had a warm welcome, as has the rest of the year group, from the St Aidan's community when moving to the Briery for y13. Following my own beliefs and values as a Christian, I have been able to exemplify my beliefs through events such as Lourdes, attending masses, completing the gold John Paul II award and one of the highlights of my past year, being installed as a Eucharistic minister.
