

iDEA is a blended learning approach that aspires to be a digital and enterprise equivalent of The Duke of Edinburgh Award.

Students take on a series of challenges that earn them points which aggregate towards their Bronze, Silver or Gold Inspiring Digital Enterprise Award.

Students earn various badges in the different learning categories (Citizen, Worker, Maker, covering topics as diverse as cybersecurity, cloud computing and e-safety; and animation, growth hacking, programming, customer relationship management and web development. >>> BUILDING DEVELOPMENTS



Over the next couple of weeks the building team will be preparing the front yard for the delivery of our temporary blocks.
