

BlackRock. As a result, they are often forced to cut essential services like healthcare and education to

meet repayment demands.

Thanks to the generosity and enthusiasm of our fellow students, we successfully raised £225. This money will go towards CAFOD's work in helping communities become self-sufficient and resilient in the face of economic challenges.

Inspiring Futures at Jesus College, Cambridge

Last week, a group of our Year 10 pupils had the incredible opportunity to take part in a residential trip to Jesus College, Cambridge, alongside pupils from schools across the North East. The day was packed with enriching academic experiences, cultural exploration and fun, giving our pupils a true taste of university life. The aim of the residential is to raise pupils' aspirations and encourage them to realise their potential ahead of starting their GCSE year in Year 11.

Jesus College is one of the 31 colleges that make up the University of Cambridge. While all pupils attend their lectures in academic departments across the university, each college acts as a mini campus, a home from home, offering University pupils accommodation, meals, kitchens, cafes and bars, sports and music facilities, libraries, and both welfare and academic support throughout their undergraduate studies. To help ensure fair access to Cambridge, every college is linked with a specific region of the UK for outreach and recruitment. This relationship is focused on increasing the number of applicants from areas with little or no previous experience of Oxford or Cambridge and often limited access to higher education more broadly.

The visit began with a warm welcome as pupils arrived at Jesus College ready for an inspiring afternoon. Pupils were introduced to the college with a welcome session held in the Frankopan Room. This engaging session helped set the tone for the rest of the visit, providing an overview of what to expect and what life at Cambridge is really like.

Pupils were then taken on a tour of the college in small groups, led by current university pupil ambassadors. This gave them the chance to explore the stunning college grounds and ask questions about pupil life from those living it first-hand.

One of the highlights of the day was the academic taster sessions, where pupils could choose from a range of lecture style sessions including Squatters' Rights: The Law of Adverse Possession, Metabolism, Extreme Adaptations and Healthy Ageing or Archimedes and Hydrostatics. These sessions were not only intellectually stimulating but also encouraged pupils to think beyond the curriculum and explore subjects they might not encounter at school.

After the sessions, pupils checked into their rooms before heading to the college dining hall for dinner and continued with a fun and competitive round of University Games. This was a great opportunity for pupils to bond with peers from other schools while also enjoying the social side of university life.

The following morning, we set off on a guided tour of the city, visiting Queens College, deepening their appreciation of Cambridge's rich history and academic environment.

Before left for home pupils took part in a Q&A session with university ambassadors, providing an invaluable opportunity to ask questions and gain insight into pupil life, study choices, and future pathways. The visit concluded with a session focused on next steps, helping pupils think about how to apply what they had learned and plan their future academic journey before returning home inspired and motivated to pursue their goals. A huge thank you to Jesus College, the pupil ambassadors, and everyone who made this experience possible!
